My mother fulfilled a host of roles in my growing up years: seamstress, chauffeur, cook, nurse, cheerleader, guidance counselor, and more. The majority of her positions changed as my siblings and I grew up, left home to pursue our dreama, and started our own families, but Mom's role as prayer intercessor remained until she started her final journey toward heaven.

Mom was a women of prayer. This irked me when I was a teenager who wanted to follow the desires of my heart, rather than do what was right. The last thing I wanted to hear was, "Grace, I'm praying that you'll listen to Jesus and change your ways." I knew Mom's prayers were powerful. Fighting them was pointless.

I was a freshman in Bible college before I began to appreciate the seriousness with which Mom embraced her intercessory role. She prayed me through the fear of making new friends, writing research papers, and auditioning for choir. She cried out to Jesus on my behalf when I sought summer employment and when a broken engagement broke my heart. Later, she pleaded for my health and safety as I moved to Nepal in my early twenties, newly married and naïve about cross-cultural life.

I knew I could count on Mom to pray me through whatever challenge I faced. This filled me with courage and gratitude. Of all the roles she played, intercession bore the greatest significance. After all, that head-strong teenager finally came around. Thanks Mom!
