THE GREAT DIVIDE

Later they sent some of the Pharisees and Herodians to Jesus to catch him in his words. They came to him and said, "Teacher, we know that you are a man of integrity. You aren't swayed by others, because you pay no attention to who they are; but you teach the way of God in accordance with the truth. Is it right to pay the imperial tax to Caesar or not? Should we pay or shouldn't we?

But Jesus know they hypocrisy. "Why are you trying to trap me? " he asked. "Bring me a denarius and let me look at it." They brought the coin, and he asked them, "Whose image is this? And whose inscription?"

"Caesars," they replied. Then Jesus said to them, "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's." And they were amazed at him. (Mark 12: 13-17)

INSIGHT:

Part of the reason the religious leaders tried to "catch Jesus in his words" (*Mark 12:13*) was to discredit Him and charge Him with blasphemy for claiming to be God (*see Matthew 26: 63-65; Luke 20:20*). Jesus made an exclusive claim that "He's the Messiah (*Matthew 26: 63-64*) and the only way to the Father: "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (*John 14:6*). The book of Acts underscores the exclusive claim: "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved" (*Acts 4:12*). John makes it clear when he wrote, "We have seen and testify that the Father has sent his Son to be the Savior of the world" (*1 John 4:14*). The good news is that in Christ, we have our Savior! -*Bill Crowder*

In a classic *Peanuts* comic strip, Linus' friend berates him for his belief in the Great Pumpkin. Walking away dejectedly, Linus says, "There are three things I have learned never to discuss with people...religion, politics, and the Great Pumpkin!" The Great Pumpkin only existed in Linus' head, but the other two topics are oh-so-real—dividing nations, families, and friends. The problem occurred in Jesus' day as well. The Pharisees were deeply religious and tried to follow the Old Testament law to the letter, The Herodians were more political, yet both groups wanted to see the Jewish people freed from the Roman oppression. Jesus didn't seem to share their goals. So they approached Him with a politically charges question: Should the people pay taxes to Caesar (*Mark 12: 14-15*)? If Jesus said yes, the people would resent Him. If He said no, the Romans could arrest Him for insurrection. Jesus asked for a coin. "Whose image is this? He asked (v.16). Everyone knew it was Caesar's. Jesus' words resonant today: "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's" (v.17). His priorities in order, Jesus avoided their trap. Jesus came to do His Father's will. Following His lead, we too can seek God and His kingdom above all else, directing the focus away from all the dissension and toward the one who is the Truth. - *Tim Gustafson*, "Our Daily Bread" 10/24

News From Pastor Billie Lou for Clarification on Retirement and Vacation Plans...

Following the United Methodist Book of Discipline, all clergy must retire at 72. I turned 72 last December, so on July 1st, 2024 I officially retired after 25 years of full time clergy leadership plus 25 years of serving as lay staff in two congregations, plus on district and Conference Boards.

The District Superintendent, Rev. John Kasper, I and the combined Staff-Pastor/Parish Relations Committees began conversations about the needs of myself and Roger and both congregations a year ago. The decision was agreed upon that I would continue serving both congregations full time one year at a time. This also was approved by the Bishop. I agreed to do that, but asked for no further increase in salary (3% is the norm). I requested that I would regain 2 extra weeks of vacation which I gave up to take this 2-point charge in 2020 (4 weeks is mandatory). In addition to that, approximately every 6-8 weeks (sometimes less or more) I would be away if there were no meetings or crucial activities scheduled for that work week (this will not include Sundays).

Recently, we looked at that agreement again for the 2025-2026 year. The decision was to continue. For the current year I took the month of August off and two more weeks at the end of September and the beginning of October. The weeks were too close together, so next summer I will schedule a little differently. An emergency pastor is scheduled as needed. This year's weeks were based on berry picking and Roger's birthday; both important to me. We used a DVD series on the life on Simon Peter that I already had (\$0), DVD on the story of how John Newton wrote the hymn, "Amazing Grace" and Sweet Adelines lead both services on September 29th. Pulpit supplies (using a guest speaker) costs each church \$200.00 per week and pastors/speakers are very difficult to find and schedule. By using the videos each church saved at least \$1000. If you have suggestions for next year, please share.

I'm writing this so that we are all on the same page—understanding—since I've heard some comments and questions through the church grapevines.

Looking forward to the future together.






