

Pastor's Page...

Summer Sermon Series:

After serving 25 years in the Michigan Conference of the UMC I formally retire on Monday, July 1st. Retirement is mandatory for pastors at 72. I turned 72 last December. Last Fall the combined Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee_members agreed that I would continue serving St. Louis First and Breckenridge for at least one more year (July 1, 2025). An agreement was made that I would not receive a raise in pay, but would get back two weeks of vacation that I gave up when appointed to this 2 point charge, for a total of 6 weeks paid vacation. I will also take time off approximately every 6 weeks (mostly to go to Copper Harbor). This will happen when the schedule allows (no meetings, major activities, office work completed and visitations/calls/connections reasonable completed). I'm calling those weeks "time off for good behavior." I will not be gone on Sundays.

For the 6 Sundays of vacation there will be a variety of pulpit supply ideas which include speakers from the congregations, community speakers, hymn sings, and video series. I will be on vacation this summer from August 7th to September 5th, that includes 4 Sundays. We will begin a 6 week video series on the life of Simon Peter presented by UMC Pastor, Rev. Adam Hamilton. We will begin the series the week before I go on vacation and we will complete it the week I return. The scheduled leaders/liturgists will lead the services in my absence. There will be no communion in September. I am looking for persons who would like to do a children's message at one or both churches for the 4 Sundays I am gone. I have lots of ideas and wonderful children's books that could be read. Please leave a message if you'd like to lead a kid's message.



Annual Conference Review:

I attended the 2024 Annual Conference of the Michigan Area U.M.C. a few weeks ago along with lay representative from both churches, Linda Johnson (SLF) and Nancy Gee (BUMC). I attended one extra day, Wednesday, where the 2024 retirees were acknowledged in a special gathering and reception. On Thursday, the clergy met with Bishop David Bard where the "state of the Michigan area church" was discussed. The Lay Representatives also had a scheduled time with the Bishop and Michigan area leaders.

While there is still anxiety and sadness, as well as questions waiting for answers, I experienced a feeling of hopefulness and forgiveness. The worship services and especially the amazing music were all highlights for me. The Bishop and the multitude of speakers were uplifting and informative.


Over 40 pastors retired, while only a handful of candidates were ordained as deacons and elders. We have a shortage of clergy leaders as most other denominations do, too. Lots of prayers needed for leadership.

The Michigan Conference will vote next year whether to accept the proposed changes to the Book Of Discipline concerning the allowance of persons who have declared themselves as LGTBQ to be ordained as deacons or elders in the church. (Remember, no local church will be forced into having an LGTBQ pastor, not will any church be forced to allow gay marriages in their local church, each church will make its own decisions). Again, regardless of your own beliefs we should all be in prayer for unity and grace.
